This template can be used for multiple purposes:

 It enables schools to effectively plan their use of the Primary PE and sport premium

 It helps schools to meet the requirements (as set out in guidance) to publish information on their Primary PE and sport premium

 It will be an effective document to support Ofsted inspections enabling schools to evidence progress in Physical Education (PE) and evidence swimming attainment, which forms part of the PE National Curriculum. We would recommend schools consider the Intent, Implementation and Impact of any spend, as examined within the Education Inspection Framework.

It is important that your grant is used effectively and based on school need.

Schools must use the funding to make additional and sustainable improvements to the quality of the PE, School Sport and Physical Activity (PESSPA) they offer. This means that you should use

they offer. This means that you should use the Primary PE and sport premium to:

- Build capacity and capability within the school to ensure that improvements made now will benefit pupils joining the school in future years
- Develop or add to the PESSPA activities that your school already offers.

The Primary PE and sport premium should not be used to fund capital spend projects; the school's core budget should fund these. Further detail on capital expenditure can be found in the updated <a href="Primary PE">Primary PE</a> and sport premium guidance.

87% of year 6 children have taken part in SSP/FHP event. Of those who have not attended, all have been given an opportunity but decided not to take up on it.

Meeting National Curriculum requirements for swimming and water safety.

Priority should always be given to ensuring that pupils can perform safe self-rescue even if they do not fully meet the first two requirements of the National Curriculum programme of study

Question	Stats:	Further context Relative to local challenges
What percentage of your current Year 6 cohort can swim competently, confidently and proficiently over a distance of at least 25 metres?	% 72	Year 6 have had an 8 week block of swimming. Of those non-swimmers, there are very few children that are exposed to swimming other than their school sessions. Some have missed lessons due to illness/lack of kit and a water safety session within their coaching block. They are re-learning to swim in a very short space of time that is not productive to helping them reach their 25m distance. We had 3 children in the cohort that missed more than 3 lessons due to fractured bones.
What percentage of your current Year 6 cohort can use a range of strokes effectively [for example, front crawl, backstroke, and breaststroke]?	% 75	80% of children were swimming within learning journey assessment 3-6 and covered a range of strokes. Of these children 46 could swim front crawl, backstoke, breastroke competently.

What percentage of your current Year 6 cohort are able to perform safe self-rescue in different water-based situations?	% 98	Some children were not assessed in this due to absence/injury or illness. Of all the children in attendance, every child completed the safe self-rescue. All children in the cohort had the opportunity to cover this when they swam in year 4.

Have you provided CPD to improve the knowledge and confidence of staff to be able to teach swimming and water safety?	No	We have a member of staff with teaching Aquatics Level 1 and they work in the water to support the non-swimmers. We use the instructors provided though the schools swimming serice to teach the rest of the groups.
